It can boost motivation, reduce learning anxiety, and encourage participation, as songs often make students more relaxed and eager to engage. The notion of motivation is difficult to explain because "different people are motivated by different things" (House, 1997: 10). As House explains,



children need to be motivated individually or within a group. By encouraging an individual child, the teacher stimulates and maintains interest in English.

- 6. Memory Retention: Music aids memory due to its rhythm and melody, making it easier to remember words and phrases. The repetitive nature of songs helps in long-term retention, turning passive vocabulary into active vocabulary over time.
- 7. Creativity and Critical Thinking: Analyzing lyrics or discussing a song's message encourages critical thinking. Teachers can use song analysis to initiate discussions, ask students to interpret meaning, or even inspire creative writing or role-playing activities.

In practice, teachers might select songs based on the level of language complexity suitable for their students, with a variety of activities, such as fill-in-the-blank exercises, lyric analysis, and group discussions. Using songs effectively makes English learning more dynamic and relatable, creating a memorable and enjoyable learning experience.

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
